## **Useful Firefox web browser add-ons**

One of these that I have come to value highly is called Flagfox; it puts a little national flag symbol in the browser's address bar right at the top of the window.

This can prove useful for various reasons, a couple of which are worth repeating:

Firstly, hunting for a replacement lock for our village hall's alarm control box yielded a possible order but the recommended website showed the Canadian flag which would have meant substantial postal chages!

A second example was looking for a new telephoto lens for my SLR camera. Again, a potentially interesting find but the website showed the site located (or hosted) in Bulgaria – not sure about security so I moved on!

Flagfox, along with a multitude of other add-ons can be found from Firefox's Open application menu Eat top right of the window,; then click on Add-ons and themes and then Extensions.

Use the search box for Flagfox and then click on Add to Firefox. Job done!

# Retford u3a Military History Group

Retford u3a has been in existence for about fourteen years and is made up of around 30 interest groups. The biggest by far is the Gardening Group, but coming a close second is the Military History Group. Run by Clarborough resident Roy Evans, the Military History group was established in 2016, and the groups first meeting was on the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the start of the Battle of the Somme on the 1<sup>st</sup> June. Monthly meetings before Covid were held at the Hallcroft Community Centre in Retford, with a guest speaker presenting a paper on a military related topic. These talks covered several topics relating to military history over the centuries.

Backing up these presentations were day trips to local and national museums as well as five-day trips abroad. In 2017 the group went to northern France and visited several locations relating to the 100 years war, and the First and Second World Wars. In 2018 a trip to Holland and Germany saw the group visit Arnhem and the Mohne Dam.

With the indecision over Brexit, coach companies didn't know if they would be allowed to travel in the EU. The decision was made in 2019 to have a five-day trip to Scotland to visit sites there.

Plans had been made to visit Belgium and Normandy, but when Covid struck everything was put on hold. Live meetings stopped taking place, but meetings were continued using Zoom. Not everyone is computer literate, so a number of members were immensely relieved when we started up again this April with live meetings. We had built up a membership using Zoom from u3a members from about eight other groups around the country. Also, we were asked to include one of our members sisters who lived in Chicago and a brother living in France. Our United States membership has now grown to four households, two in Chicago, one in Michigan and one in Pittsburgh.

Using Zoom we have continued to run meetings as well as live meetings every two weeks. The decision has now been made to run 'Hybrid' meetings. These are live meetings broadcast simultaneously on Zoom. Hallcroft Community Centre does not have broadband, but happily for the group, Clarborough Village Hall does. So, from 14:00 on the 8th September, the group will have it's first hybrid meeting in Clarborough. If you have an interest in military history from any era you might like to come along to one of our meetings. These meetings take place in the village hall

on the second Thursday afternoon of each month starting at 14:00. There will be an entrance charge of £2.50, to cover the costs of the hall hire and your free cup of coffee or tea (with of course biscuits).

# **UK Covid infections are rising again**

You will have heard the news that Covid infection rates across the UK rose sharply this summer.

Two-and-a-half years into the pandemic we're back facing new variants, a surge in infections, questions about whether the NHS can cope and what it means for all our lives. It's also giving us a clearer idea of what living with Covid is going to look like.

The driving force behind the surge in infections is the double act of BA.4 and BA.5 mutations of the Omicron variant. UK Government has confirmed that these variants have become the most common across all area.

The original Omicron had an impressive ability to spread and overcome the immune defences our bodies have built up to keep the virus out. BA.4 and BA.5 are even better. Their ascent started before big summer events like the Jubilee celebrations or Glastonbury so it's not like we had just partied our way into a new wave.

So far there is no indication that BA.4 or BA.5 are associated with new symptoms or more severe disease. This is to be expected, given that the majority of mutations are similar to those found in other Omicron lineages, although it something that will continue to be closely monitored by the WHO and local health teams.

So far, vaccination means that the rise in cases is not translating to a rise in severe illness and deaths. UKHSA (UK Health Security Agency) scientists are urging anyone who has not had all the vaccines they are eligible for to make sure that they get them as soon as possible. However, as in previous waves, an increase in COVID-19 cases overall can result in an increase in hospitalisations, ICU admissions and deaths.

So, as mentioned by many experts in the earlier stages of the pandemic, it is likely that we will have to learn to live with Covid-19 just as we have learned to live with – and get jabbed against – influenza. This message has been getting through to many as we have already seen with face masks again rising in popularity.

Just to remind readers, the expert advice remains:

- get vaccinated the number one best thing!
- let fresh air in if meeting others indoors
- practise good hygiene:
- wash your hands
- cover your coughs and sneezes
- clean your surroundings frequently
- wear a face covering or a face mask, particularly if you are in crowded and enclosed spaces.

# Chesterfield Canal Walking Festival

The fourth Chesterfield Canal Walking Festival will run from 10<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> September.with some 40 walks on offer varying from a couple of miles to the full 46 miles of the canal over three consecutive days.

The Chesterfield Canal Trust, which organises the event, once again believes it to be the largest canal focused walking festival in the country, with more walks and walkers than any other. There is a brochure with the full programme, or you can find everything on the Trust's website – see end of this article.

The walks must be booked in advance either online or by ringing 01246 477 569. All are free except those that involve a boat trip.

The canal towpath is officially designated the Cuckoo Way and it runs from Chesterfield to the River Trent, through Derbyshire, South Yorkshire and North Nottinghamshire. There are walks taking place at various locations along its full length. The Trust's Cuckoo Way officer, David Blackburn said: "We look forward to seeing old friends again and hope to welcome many newcomers too. We believe that our 46 mile long canal has parts that are as attractive as any in the country. Do take the opportunity to

join a walk in an area with which you are not familiar, and you will hopefully be pleasantly surprised."

This extensive programme covers many popular areas – though perhaps using one or two different paths to previous years. Some walks will take you through lovely countryside, others have special interest such as architecture and steam trains; one includes a visit to a



football stadium. Most of the walks end near a café or a pub. Most are easily accessible by public transport. No Chesterfield Canal Walking Festival would be complete without the very popular Boats & Boots that combine a walk with a ride on one of the Trust's trip boats.



## Remember the Zeppelins?

No, not Led-Zeppelin rock band, the Zeppelin rigid airships which inaugurated commercial pioneered passenger flights with DELAG (*Deutsche Luftschifffahrts-Aktiengesellschaft* (German for "German Airship Travel Corporation") from 1910 until the outbreak of World War 1.

After the war the Versailles Treaty initially forbade Germany from building airships but this was lifted in 1926 Larger airships were then constructed – LZ 127 *Graf Zeppelin* and LZ 129 *Hindenburg* followed and both of these established regular transatlantic flights until the spectacular disaster of 6th May, 1937, that destroyed the Hindenburg as it tried to land at the Naval Air Station Lakehurst in Manchester Township, New Jersey, United States.

Now wind forward to 2022; Spain's Air Nostrum Group – a regional partner to Iberia, the Spanish flag-carrier airline - has announced a provisional agreement to acquire airships to run commercial services! The airships it plans to use are Hybrid Air Vehicles (HAV) *Airlander 10* which has a passenger capacity of up to 100.

This plan is not only part of strategies to reduce the air transport sector's carbon footprint but also aims to use this vehicle to improve customer access since these hybrid air vehicle can adapt to the specific needs of each destination, having the ability of landing on any reasonably flat surface – or even on water.

A bit of chemistry: While hot air was, and still is, used to lift relatively small balloons, early airships (also known as derigibles) used hydrogen as their lighter-than-air lifting agent, either in a balloon or in a semi-rigid or completely rigid structure in which they filled gas cells.

The problem with hydrogen, although being the lightest of all gases and so the best for giving lift is that hydrogen is an extremely good fuels and forms explosive mixtures with air – hence the Hindenburg disaster above.

Readers may wonder, then, about recent mentions of *the hydrogen economy* and it being used as replacement for various fuels currently in use. Watch this space!

Because of hydrogen's dangerous history in airships it has been replaced by helium which is almost as light but completely inert and so non-combustible.

# A new section for self-driving vehicles has been added to the Highway Code

From 1st July, 2022 new rules on the use of self-driving vehicles in Great Britain have come into force. The changes are included in a new section in The Highway Code which can be accessed for free on GOV.UK. Currently only vehicles with advanced driver assistance systems are available in the UK.

No vehicles in Great Britain have been classed as selfdriving yet but they could start to be as soon as next year. Any that are classed as self-driving will be listed on GOV.UK.

#### What's changing in the new section

The changes to the Code will help ensure the new technology will be used safely, explaining clearly that while travelling in self-driving mode, motorists must be ready to resume control in a timely way if they are prompted to – such as when they approach motorway exits. It also includes details about appropriate insurance needed for self-driving cars.

The plans also include a change to current regulation, allowing drivers to view content which is not related to driving on built-in display screens, while the self-driving vehicle is in control.

It will however, still be illegal to use mobile phones in selfdriving mode, given the greater risk they pose in distracting drivers as shown in research.

The government is working with the manufacturer, retailer and leasing industries to ensure that anyone accessing a self-driving vehicle will receive advice on how to use it.

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
# Early heatwaves hit Europe, leading to warnings for the future

At the time of writing in early July reports are flooding in of record temperatures across Europe – and in the UK as readers will already know.

France experienced 40°C on 16<sup>th</sup> June, the earliest at that date since records began. Parts of Spain exceeded 40°C in late June with Germany seeing similar figures at that time and also experiencing many wildfires – another associated risk as temperatures climb.

With climate change now firmly established experts are warning that everyone needs to start to take the associated risks seriously and start planning for the future.

One massive-scale example is that of power station cooling – crucial whether these are coal, oil, gas or nuclear powered. All of these use water to condense the steam leaving the electricity generating turbines to increase efficiency.



The diagram above is a typical nuclear powered station but replacing the left-hand *containment structure* by a coal, oil or gas, boiler would yield one of these power stations. If climate heatwaves increase we will see less water available from rivers and other natural sources which will directly affect the amount of electricity that these power stations will be able to generate since cool water is need to flow through the turbine's condenser to dramatically increase its efficiency.

While we usually see a reduction in electricity demand in the summer months as household heating is reduced, with rising summer temperatures we will probably see this reversed as more properties have air conditioning systems installed.

At a personal level, a range of tips include keeping our homes cooler by using light-coloured blinds or curtains to reflect daytime sunlight, identify a 'safe cool room' in our house and keep its door closed to prevent heat from the rest of the house invading it. Light colours – white is best – for our clothing as well as exterior paintwork can all help to reduce heat absorbed from sunlight.

In the longer term major infrastructure changes will be needed to stop road surfaces melting and railways buckling.

A final point that is currently being debated is the naming of heatwaves just like we already name storms. This seems to personalise the risks, making people 'sit up and take notice'. This staretegy has already been adopted in Seville in Spain.

Retford Child Contact Centre is a warm, friendly, safe place in town with toys, games and space for non-resident parents to spend regular time with their children. Trained staff are on hand to welcome everyone and provide refreshments. Grandparents can also use the service. Available fortnightly on Saturday afternoons. Sessions are free.

If a parent does not wish to meet the other parent, handover arrangements can be made by the Centre. . (NB The Centre is a Supported, not Supervised centre)

You and your ex-partner can arrange a referral to the Centre through the NACCC website – we would love to see you. A mediator or solicitor can help with the process but it isn't necessary.

## **Chris's Sausage Loaf**

## Ingredients

One 2lb loaf - of your choice 1lb Sausage meat 2 eggs 1 onion - large, finely chopped 2 cloves garlic\*



#### Method

- 1. Cut off the top of the loaf just sufficiently thick to form a cap on the finished loaf.
- Pull the soft interior of both parts of the loaf out by hand - break these pieces into small 'crumbs' and place in a large basin. Set the loaf 'shell' and 'cap' to one side.
- 3. Chop the onion finely and add to the bread crumbs.
- 4. Add sausage meat to the bread crumbs and
- Add eggs to the mixture.
- \*Add any other flavourings you fancy. These could include herbs, spices - your choice!
- 7. Blend all of the dry ingredients and eggs with a strong fork until the mixture is fairly uniform.
- 8. Load all of the above mixture into the loaf shell as prepared in 2 above. Firm down the mixture so that it fits in the space originally occupied by the bread
- 9. Place the loaf cap prepared in 1. above on top of the filled shell. If you want a glazed finish, brush the cap with oil and sprinkle with a little salt.
- 10. Place the finished loaf on a suitably greased (olive oil) baking tray.
- 11. Cooking for roughly 60-75 minutes at gas mark 5 / 190°C. After roughly 45 minutes check that the cap is not getting too dark - if so, cover loaf with baking foil.

Can be served hot or cold. The above quantities will serve 4 with just a little side serving of vegetables or more with larger side dishes.

The picture above shows the results using half of a home baked loaf based on a standard 500g bread mix.

## Some 1900-1910 history

The following have been extracted from the notes to be found in the transcripts of Clarborough School's Log Books that can be explored on our community website – go to *Education & Training* ▶ *Primary School History* where you will find transcripts of Log Books for 1871-87, 1887-93, 1893-99, 1899-1910 and 1910-1922.

The 1899-1910 Log Book has some annotations that give a flavour for how things were all those years ago:

**22 May 1900** Mines Act (The Mines (Prohibition of Child Labour Underground) Act) 1900 bans employment of children (boys) in pits under the age of 13yrs.

**1 Jan 1904** Licencing of motor cars and fitting of number plates introduced.

**29 Jun 1905** Foundation of the Automobile Association (AA)

**12 Jan 1906** General Election landslide to Liberals; Liberal (377); Conservatives (157); Irish Nationalists (83); Labour (53)

**10 Feb 1906** Launch of H.M.S. Dreadnought outdates all previous battleships.

**12 Feb 1906** Parliamentary Labour Party formed; chairman Keir Hardv.

**22 Mar 1906** First International Rugby Union match (England 35 France 8)

**25 Jul 1907** Baden-Powell forms Boy Scouts **7 May 1908** Asquith (Prime Minister) announces his government's intention to introduce old-age pensions.

**16 Oct 1908** Samuel Cody makes first aeroplane flight from British soil.

**1 Jan 1909** First payment of old-age pension; 5 shillings (25p in modern terms) per week for over 70s.


**15 Mar 1909** Selfridge's, the first American-style department store in England opens in London's Oxford Street.

# June 2<sup>nd</sup> Stepping outside for a while! - The Clarborough Platinum Jubilee Beacon

The Beacon at the top of Howbeck Lane was lit for the Jubilee Celebrations a 9.45 pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> June. This was one of about 3,000 Beacons lit Nationally - all at 9.45 pm.

Beacons can be like the one in the Parish, a basket on a pole, but can also be a simple bonfire, best placed on a hill to be able to be seen from far away.

One of the first uses of Beacon chains was in warning the



army of the approach of the Spanish Armada in 1588 with beacons lit in turn as the ships sailed up the English Channel. They were the FaceBook of the 16th Century!! In

1887 they were

used for the first

time as a celebration. This was for the Silver Jubilee (50 years) of Queen Victoria's reign and then 10 years later on her Diamond Jubilee. George V is the only other Monarch to have had a Silver Jubilee Beacon celebration until Queen Elizabeth II. There have been Silver (25 years -1977), Golden (50 years - 2002) and Diamond (60 year -2012) Jubilees for Queen Elizabeth II, each one marked with Beacons being lit. This Platinum Jubilee was, of course, unique as Her Majesty is the first Monarch in British history to reign for 70 years.

About 50 people attended the lighting, which was organised by the Parish Council. At 9.35 pm a solo trumpeter (Edward Baldock from Beckingham), played the tune 'Majesty" which was specially composed for the Platinum Jubilee Beacon Lighting and to be played at that time at all Beacons. He then played the National Anthem at 9.40 pm and this was followed by a 15 second countdown to the actual lighting at exactly 9.45 pm. Other Beacons were seen in other Parishes to the north and west of Clarborough but some distance away.

Thanks go to Graham Bartle for loading the Beacon with straw and for inventing a new lighting system which allowed the countdown to take place and to Clarborough & Welham Parish Council for again organising the event.

## 4th June – Saturday Senior Citizens' Afternoon Tea

The Clarborough and District WI once again organised a summer event for Senior Residents of Clarborough, Hayton and Welham, this year linked to the Platinum Jubilee which took place in Clarborough Village Hall decorated with streams of Union Flags, courtesy of the Parish Council.

72 of our more senior residents from both Parishes were catered for although, due to illness, a number were unable to attend. These people were taken their Afternoon Tea after the event. Those attending were served with an assortment of finger sandwiches, small cakes and also cream and strawberry scones on traditional tiered cake stands. All of the cakes were baked by the WI members. Tea and coffee were served in abundance! Following the

tea, those present all offered their congratulations to the Queen as proposed by Lesley Baines, the current WI President, and toasted with a glass of prosecco. Funding for the event came from



Hayton Parish Council, County Councillor Tracey Taylor and Clarborough & Welham Parish Council. A good time was had by all present.

Muslim Charity is an international NGO working to eradicate poverty in the developing world through supporting health, water and sanitation, education and emergency response initiatives in 17 countries around the world. With its headquarters in Retford, there has always therefore been an interest to support local causes as well. This has led to Muslim Charity historically supporting Bassetlaw Hospital with

Earlier on in the year, Muslim Charity provided life-saving defibrillators to two Bassetlaw villages (see our Summer issue).

As part of its continuing efforts to support local communities, and with assistance from the offices of Rt Hon Robert Jenrick MP (Newark) and Brendan Clarke-Smith MP (Bassetlaw), the provision of benches that can cater for local villages was a need that was highlighted. As a result, Muslim Charity procured six benches which were manufactured by GD Steel in Belfast and shipped over from Northern Ireland ahead of the unveiling ceremony. The design of the benches commemorates the lifelong service of the Queen coinciding with the Platinum Jubilee this year and it also depicts the national flowers of England (rose), Wales (daffodil), Scotland (thistle) and Northern Ireland (shamrock) on the benches, a wonderful way of bringing people together from across the nation.

Commenting on the occasion, Bakhtyar Pirzada (Vice Chairman of Muslim Charity), said, "In rural landscapes, villages and across walking routes, benches – which sometimes go unnoticed – play a crucial role in providing ease and comfort during that moment of rest and reflection. The jubilee benches which are unique in their design, additionally marking the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty, the Queen, will hopefully be a memorable addition to the local villages and a

the procurement of a brand new resuscitaire unit for its maternity ward and also funding the Bassetlaw Food Bank to support local communities. Elsewhere in the UK, Muslim Charity continues to run a monthly homeless feed project in Manchester's City Centre since January 2018 and supports boxing gyms in London and Watford to help young people access sports and in doing so help reduce the rates of delinquency and violent crime in those areas.

## Freemasons' inventions

Exploring Retford could lead readers to discovering The Masonic Hall at the top of Carolgate. This was originally a cinema called The Regent which opened in 1911 and was rebuilt in 1927 in Art Deco style. It was renamed The Ritz in 1934, but closed in 1957. In 1962 the building went on sale and was purchased by Vernon Lodge, one of the oldest in Nottinghamshire. It became the centre for the Carolgate Lodge in 1980. Since then the hall has undergone extensive external and internal refurbishment to reach its present impressive Art Deco state – a very rare style in Retford!.

Freemasons trace their origins back to medieval stonemason guilds. For Freemasons, there are four important values that help define their path through life: Integrity, Friendship, Respect and Charity. In today's world filled with uncertainty, these principles ring as true now as they have at any point in the organisation's history. Local Freemasons belong to Masonic Lodges which are the basic organisational unit of Freemasonry. These local Lodges are linked to national or regional Grand Lodges such as the United Grand Lodge of England.

During Retford's Heritage Open Day The Masonic Hall, will host exhibitions of important inventions by Freemasons over the years and will also give talks on Freemasonry.

Here we reflection on three inventions by Freemasons that had huge implications.

We start with famous Freemason, Mark Twain's invention – the bra strap!



Famous author and humorist Mark Twain invented the bra strap. At first, the strap was intended to be used to fasten garments such as shirts. It was created to replace the popularly used suspenders.


Twain envisioned the invention to help in making clothes adjustable to fit people perfectly. The idea was patented on 19<sup>th</sup> December 1871. The patent read 'for vests, pantaloons or other garments requiring straps'

However, the invention did not become popular for its intended use. Since, at that time, vests had buckles to tighten them up, and pantaloons didn't need to be snug, they were a better fit when baggy. Instead, it ended up being an essential part of brassieres and they are used in designing the women's undergarment to this day.

Apart from being an inventor and author, Mark Twain was a Freemason. He was initiated into the Polar Star Lodge No. 79 of Saint Louis on 26<sup>th</sup> December 1860. He proceeded to receive his first degree on 18<sup>th</sup> February 1961. He was later raised to Master Mason. Due to his busy career, Twain wasn't actively involved in Masonic activities. However, he

maintained his affiliation to the brotherhood until his engagement and then marriage to Olivia Langdon in February, 1870.

A second world-changing invention was that of Penicillin.



Penicillin was discovered by Sir Alexander Flemming. After World War I, while Alexander was studying the influenza virus, he noticed mold that accidentally grew on the equipment growing the staphylococci germ.

His interest was sparked by the fact that the mould had formed a bacteria-free zone around itself. Fleming carried out numerous experiments on the mould which he later named Penicillin. His discovery had a huge impact on the development of modern medicine.

Alexander Fleming was first initiated into the Sancta Maria Lodge No. 2682 in 1909 at the age of 27. Alexander Flemming was also a member of Misericordia Lodge No. 323286.

Our final Freemason's invention – bifocals.



Benjamin Franklin had several inventions in his name, among which was the concept of bifocals, in other words, double glasses. Benjamin realized that as he advanced in age, his eyesight became worse. He became both short and long-sighted. Due to his double eyesight condition, he was forced to have two different pairs of spectacles. Franklin soon became tired of switching from one pair to another leading him to invent the 'double glasses.' He merged the lenses between the two different pairs; reading and distance, into one.

The glasses' now coupled had two distinctions, top horizontal layer for distance and bottom for reading. Thanks to his invention, a single pair of glasses can be multipurpose.

Benjamin Franklin joined Freemasons in 1731. He was initiated into St.John's Lodge in Philadelphia. A few years later, he was elected Worshipful Master of the Lodge. He served as a member of the brotherhood for over 60 years. His long life dedication is a clear indication of Franklin's devotion to Freemasonry.


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# **Wheatley Local History Group**

Brackets can be used in the usual way for more complex sums. Try a few examples:

Found yourself looking at a map of Europe but wanted to convert the distances from kilometres to miles, or want to know your body weight in kilograms when your bathroom scales are telling to you how many stones you weigh?

These and a multitude of other sums can be done by simply logging on to Google and then typing your problem into the main search box!

For the first example above, just type 87 kilometres in miles and the answer (54.05) pops up instantly. Similarly, typing 11 stones 6 lbs in kg yields the answer 72.57 kg.

### **Welcome to PCSO John Dale**

John Dale has become our local PCSO 4280 (Police Community Support Officer) following Dave Airey retirement in March. John recently came to Clarborough Village Hall's Coffee, Cake & Chat (CCC) morning and spent a considerable amount of time chatting to locals to get a feel for our community.

Rather than talk about John, I'll pass over to him here and let him give you a feel for his background...



I have been a PCSO for 5 years and have just transferred to Harworth Station from Worksop. # **Keyless vehicle thefts**

Nottinghamshire Police have noticed an increase in keyless car thefts. This is due to technology acquired by suspects which enables them to transmit the radio signals from the key out to the vehicle enabling an easy and quick escape.

Criminals general work in pairs, one has a relay amplifiers which tries to detect the signal transmitted by your car key. The other has a transmitter that sends this signal to the car, opening it up.

To prvent such thefts a range of advice includes keeping car keys well inside the building to limit their signals getting

outside, keeping them inside metal sotrage such as biscuit tins or even filing cabinets. If street parking is necessary, parking the vehicle such that the owner's house isn't immediate obvious. For more thorough set of advice, visit: https://www.carwow.co.uk/blog/keyless-car-theft-prevention

To protect your vehicles Nottinghamshire Police are recommending the use of faraday pouches which block the signal, these can be bought for approx £7 online or alternatively if you visit the front counter of Retford or Worksop Station we have pouches we can supply (limited stock).

## Reminder about use of E-scooters

With the summer holidays rapidly approaching I would like to issue a reminder to the members of our communities around the use of privately owned e-scooters.

The number of complaints across our community have decreased in relation to the use of e-scooters but please do not forget that it is currently against the law to ride a privately owned e-scooter on a public road or pavement.

They should only be used on private land for which the user has permission to use.

Any person stopped by an officer could result in a warning being issued and should a user of an e-scooter be stopped for a second time then this could result in seizure of the e-scooter under Section 165 Road Traffic Act 1988.

# UK could be a net electricity exporter as soon as 2026

Recent reports strongly point to UK Governments moves to implement its Net Zero Strategy leading to strong exports of electricity generated from massive investments in offshore wind farms.

For many years UK electricity grids have drawn supplies in times of peak demand from the likes of French nuclear reactors and other European power stations via subsea cables known as *interconnectors*. Currently there are seven of these linking UK to Europe but more are planned.

With UK aiming to reach net-zero emissions by 2050 the Government plans to see development of a wave of off-shore wind farms and also solar installations. Although projecting future energy demands and production remains difficult, many analysts are predicting that as soon as 2026 the UK would be a net power exporter via these interconnectors.

Electricity generation in the UK is changing as Government policies aim to become more carbon-neutral by reducing burning fossil fuels such as coal, oil and natural gas (methane).

The following figures for May, 2022 show the latest data for our electricity energy generation:

Nuclear	17.3%
Solar	6.3%
Biomass	3.4%
Imports	2.4%
Hydro	1.6%
Storage	0.9%
Coal	<0.1%

# **Tour of Britain is coming to Retford!**

On Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> September Nottinghamshire will host the fifth stage of the 2022 Tour of Britain bike race. The 190km route – approximately 118 miles – from West Bridgford to Mansfield will take in key county landmarks and attractions such as world-famous cricket ground Trent Bridge, the legendary Sherwood Forest and popular tourist attraction Clumber Park.



The 2022 Tour of Britain bike race is the 18<sup>th</sup> of the current series that began in 2004 and is part of the UCI Europe Tour. This year's race will comprise eight stages between 4<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> September starting in Aberdeen and finishing on the Isle of Wight. The final list of 100 riders for the 2022 event should be published on 3<sup>rd</sup> September. For this list plus everything else about this year's race, go to the official website at:

For local readers (and drivers!) you need to know that the race will come into Retford down London Road and then follow the A638 Arlington Way before turning left at the Moorgate/Amcott Way traffic lights and then leaving for Worksop at the Amcott Way/North Road roundabout. Exact timings are, clearly, dependent on how the race develops but is anticipated around midday. Editor's note: The above route was published by the Tour of Britain organisers on 13th June but readers should check for any later amendments to this route.

#### Local road closures

Between start and finish locations there will be a 'rolling road closure' system. This is where the race route, and junctions with access roads onto the route, are closed while the race passes through.

The length of closure of rolling road blocks depends upon how dispersed the riders are. Typically, the lead motorcycle instigating the closure is 15 minutes ahead of the lead rider. The closure then remains in place until all riders and race cars have passed through.

### History of our bicylces

The modern bicycle had its origins in a two-wheeled, stearable *Laufmachine* (German = running machine) patented in 1817 by Baron Karl von Drais although various claims have been made for earlier non-patented examples. English cartright Denis Johnson produced his *Velocipede* which became guite a rage in 1819 but then fell from

favour as riders boots quickly wore through and several were fined for riding on pavements.

Through the 1820 to 1850 a range of three and four wheel human-powered vehicle were developed that used pedals, initially linked to the front wheel.

Through the latter part of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, bicycle developments saw huge changes in wheel sizes as various pedal arrangements initially drove the front wheels. However, with increasing quality of their metal frames and the development of chain drives to rear wheels and then gears as well as pneumatic tires, both the speed and comfort of bicycles reached out to a vast market.

# Why is our media so misleading?

Have you noticed that whenever we hear discussions on to that explore the differences between London and the rest of England, the centres mentioned are always Manchester and sometimes followed by Newcastle?

Your editor has increasingly found this irritating since he grew up in Birmingham before moving to Clarborough in the mid-1970s. This irritation is reinforced in the light of the following data:

Liverpool	0.86 million
Sheffield	0.69 million
Manchester	0.40 million
Newcastle	0.19 million

Given Birmingham's fairly central location in England, why does it not receive the sort of recognition that the above data suggests.

We might add that, if England ever decides to have its own regional authority like those of Scotland, Wales and northern Ireland, then Birmingham would seem to be the ideal, central, location.
