Dear Friends

As I write, we are fast approaching Advent Sunday and our preparation for Christmas will begin. The traditional themes of Advent allow us – through meditation, prayer, and affirmation – to contemplate ways to share our deepest gifts: hope and faith, peace, love, and joy.

Advent Week 1: Hope and Faith – I look for the many ways the good I seek is already mine.

We contemplate both hope and faith as we spiritually prepare our hearts and minds for Christmas ... Blessed are we, for each of us has access to hope, belief, and faith in the Christmas story's promise of infinite good and love everlasting.

Advent Week 2: Peace – I affirm the peace of God as my welcomed companion.

In the Gospel of Luke, because he is so old, Zechariah questions whether paternity is possible, like Mary's initial response to her improbable pregnancy. But while Mary's question is answered, Zechariah is chastised for doubting, then struck mute for the duration of his wife's pregnancy. Muting the perpetual cycle of thought is a gift that brings greater peace. For Zechariah, muteness was imposed. We are called to mute our own thoughts ... With quiet minds and open hearts, we find rest in the peace that surpasses all understanding.

Advent Week 3: Love – I receive love graciously and reflect it to the whole world.

What that means for us is that from his birth, Jesus taught that we should love everyone: black, brown, or white; rich or poor; cool or nerdy; gay, straight, or questioning; and people of all political persuasions. At our core, we are one in God's love. It's a view of unconditional love that defines Christ succinctly.

Advent Week 4: Joy – I relax, release and enjoy the wonder of the present moment.

When we light the Advent candle for joy, we remind ourselves of the spiritual truth of this season: "Unto us a child is born." In telling the Christmas story, the Gospel writers remind us that when things seem darkest, joy can come in unexpected places and small packages. Children remind us of the joy of playing, giving, learning, and loving. In the presence of such joy, our inner child can awaken our Christ nature and then the Messiah is truly born.

I wish you peace this Christmas and a happy New Year.

THERE IS ROOM

(The Methodist Church's Advent and Christmas campaign 2022)

And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn. Luke 2:7

In the Christmas story, we are made acutely aware that there was no room for Joseph and Mary to rest when they arrived in Bethlehem, in the more traditional places reserved for hospitality in Jewish culture. This meant they had to use other spaces which were available.

Jesus' birth changed everything and made room for us in God's Kingdom. As part of the Methodist Church, we seek to demonstrate our open, inclusive and welcoming nature by saying to all people, 'There is Room' for you.

There is Room for us all in the story of God's boundless love, no matter where we are, how we feel, or how hopeless everything might seem.

There is Room for us all, no matter how much we may feel looked down on, no matter what shame or guilt or prejudice we may carry.

There is Room for us all, no matter how alone, or different we may feel.

There is Room for us all, even if we feel stuck in cycles of addiction, or our lives have become flooded with hate and despair.

At Christmas, and beyond, we celebrate this with a simple invitation:

Come, just as you are, because There is Room for you.

STARS (Yvonne)

Stars seem to be all around us at this time of the year – in windows, on Christmas trees and of course in the heavens – visible on a clear night. The starriest nights are when there is no moon. Stars and planets seem to move from east to west. In winter there are star clusters, constellations and December's meteor shower. Many believe that there was a conjunction of stars when Jesus was born. Wise men followed the star from the east.

The magnificent and extraordinary Sagrada Familia basilica (or temple) in Barcelona was designed by Gaudi. Work began in 1882 and it is still unfinished. The Nativity facade was built between 1894 and 1930. Many sculptures show the birth and early life of Jesus in the temple and carpenter's workshop.

A 12 point star was added to the Virgin Mary tower in November 2021. The star of Bethlehem is a huge glass and steel structure measuring 24.6 feet and weighing 5.5 tons. The Archbishop said that lighting it would be a historic moment after a year of darkness.

Other facades depict the Passion and Ascension. 12 bells represent the 12 apostles.



Cologne cathedral is famous for holding the shrine of the Three Wise Men – a holy relic.

Three Kings Day is celebrated as a festival in Spain. They arrive by ship, helicopters and camels. Floats form a parade with children distributing sweets – a time of great celebration.

We three kings of Orient are, bearing gifts, we travel so far, field and fountain, moor and mountain, following yonder star.

O star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright.

Westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to your perfect light.

In Italian folklore, La Befana is an old woman or witch who loves housework. Legend says that she turned down an invitation from the Wise Men to join them to find baby Jesus as she had too much sweeping and housework to do (similar to the story of Mary and Martha.) She tried to follow with a basket of toys for little Jesus but could not find them. She has been searching ever since and on the night before Epiphany on January 6th brings presents to children in Italy. If they have been naughty, they might get coal, onions or garlic – though the coal is made of sugar!

RECIPE CORNER (Yvonne)



Cheesy Christmas Stars Star pastry cutters are festive (Boyes have sets of different sizes)

150g / 6oz SR flour ½ tsp of salt 75g/3oz butter or marg 75g/3oz cheese finely grated 1 egg & 1 tblsp milk, beaten together

Heat oven to 200°C/400°F.

Rub butter or marg into the flour and salt with fingers to make fine crumbs. Leave a tablespoon of cheese on a saucer. Add rest to bowl and stir in. Put a tablespoon of egg & milk mix into a cup. Mix rest into flour to make a dough. Roll out on floury surface. Cut out stars. Brush with egg mix and sprinkle with cheese. Bake on a greased tray for 8-10 minutes.

Starry Mince Pies

Shortcrust pastry Stewed apple Mincemeat

Heat oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas 4


Cut bases with round cutter – put in patty tray. Add a little stewed apple, then mincemeat then a pastry star. Bake about 20 minutes until golden. When cool, dust with icing sugar.

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THE WISE MEN AND THEIR GIFTS

.... Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him."

Matthew 2: 1-2



They were Magi, they travelled from the East following a star, and they brought three gifts: gold for someone important; perfume for someone special; and spices for someone who would die.

It is unlikely that they were kings, but they were wise – they studied the skies and with the help of old scriptures they worked out that this special star would lead them to a new king, someone very special. They obviously journeyed for many weeks, if not months.

As they were looking for a new king they went off course, going first to the palace in Jerusalem where one might expect to find royalty. Then, after Herod's 'wise men' consulted the Jewish scriptures, the travellers were redirected to Bethlehem, and so got back on track with the star. They came to a surprising place: it was so quiet, there were no crowds of family or excited visitors. They wondered if they were in the right place and then ... well ... they just knew.

They didn't just offer gifts to the baby, they knelt in worship and homage – can you imagine that? These would have been important people where they came from. They were wealthy and respected, yet here they were, kneeling before a small child. It was what felt right for them at that time.

As well as the three gifts for which they are famous, they brought other gifts: their wisdom, their effort and their sacrifice as they journeyed doggedly for many miles. And they applied their wisdom well – realising that they should not return to Jerusalem.

And one last thing ... the wise men were foreigners, they had come from the East, a wonderful reminder that Jesus did not just come to the Jewish nation, but for you and me and for all nations.

TEARS AND CELEBRATION

One Christmas tradition that will see a change this year, is 'The Queen's Speech'. Christmas broadcasts by the monarch began in 1932, when George V spoke on the radio. Elizabeth II used radio for the first five years of her reign, until the advent of the television broadcast in 1957.

These speeches became an important part of the Christmas Day celebrations for many in Britain and across the Commonwealth. They covered current issues and concerns, and the Queen's reflections on what Christmas meant to her – she was never afraid to speak about her Christian faith.

It will be very different without Her late Majesty this year. The Royal family, for the second year running, will have a Christmas without a loved one. The country will have its first Christmas without a remarkable, record-breaking Queen at its helm, who has left us such an example to follow. Some of you will also be experiencing your first Christmas without someone very dear to you. It reminds me of a song from the musical Joseph – "There's one more angel in heaven, there's one more star in the sky there's one less place at our table, there's one more tear in my eye."

Following the Queen's passing, Katherine Jenkins recorded a song called "Tears and Celebration". We never had the chance to use it in a service, so here are the words.

(It is sung to the tune 'Dim Ond Iesu/Cymraeg' (best known for 'Here is love vast as the ocean')

We see tears and celebration,
For this life so dignified,
Bearing thanks and hearts of sadness,
To the God of death and life.
As he takes her to his promise,
Of an audience with the King,
We remember all she gave us,
Wreaths of gratitude we bring.

In these days of change and trial, Be the rock on which we stand, When we fear in this new season, Hold us firmly in your hands. May we rise to her example, To be humble, kind and fair, Swift to pray and slow to anger, Choosing faith and not despair.

In the midst of coronation,
She once knelt in silent prayer,
Oil was poured in Christ's commission,
Called to lead her people there.
May we know that same anointing,
Move in royal authority,
Then speak liberty and healing,
To a world in need of peace.

Lord forgive, when pride and envy, Leave our nation bruised and stained, Turn us back towards our calling, To make your name great again. May we rise above divisions, Lord, our brokenness we bring, That a more united kingdom, Would give glory to the King.



LOST STAR MAZE


Can you help the lost, sad star find his way to the happy star.



MAKE A PRAYER STAR

Out there amongst the planets are billions of stars. In fact, there are more stars in the universe than grains of sand on all the beaches on earth. How impressive is that? Each one made by God to light up the sky.

Make a prayer star, to remind you that we can pray to the God who created all the stars in the sky.



You might need some help using scissors.

- 1. Cut out two star shapes from coloured card.
- 2. On the first star, make a cut from the bottom of the star to the middle. Punch a hole in the top.
- 3. On the second star, make a cut from the top to the middle.
- 4. Write on the star some words or names to pray for, such as family, friends, peace ...
- 5. Slot the stars together using the slits to create a 3D star and fix into place with tape.
- 6. Tie some string or cotton through the hole then hang the star somewhere to remind you that you can talk to God in prayer and share your hopes and dreams with him.
