Defibrillator Funding for Community Spaces

The Department of Health and Social Care is currently running a £1 million match funded Community Automated External Defibrillators Fund. The funding is aimed at increasing the number of AEDs in public places where they are most needed and to help save lives.

All types of organisations may apply.

To be eligible, applicants must:

- Not be an organisation that is eligible for the Department of Education scheme, eg, a school or an academy.
- Locate the secure defibrillator on an external wall in an area that is accessible to members of the public 24 hours per day. The equipment must be installed and registered on The Circuit within 4 weeks.
- Be able to provide an electrical power source.
- Provide match funding for their application (c. £750).

The funding is based on a 'first come first served basis'.

Applications will be accepted until all the funding has been allocated.

There are about 400 units left. And it is expected that the scheme will close to applications within four to six weeks from 1 November 2024 (by the end of November or mid December 2024). However, it could be sooner.

<u>DHSC Community Automated External Defibrillator (AED)</u> Fund



Funding to Support Core Costs of Small Charities

Charities and social enterprises supporting children and young people, disadvantaged families, prisoners, and exoffenders can apply for funding to help cover their core costs.

Two types of grants are available:

- Small grants up to £3,000, but usually £1,000 or
- Large grants over £3,000. However, only a few large grants are awarded each year and only to charities known to the Trust.

The funding will support small-scale, local initiatives. Priorities include effective use of volunteers and encouraging past and current users to participate. And



ensuring that funds awarded will promote community cohesion and the development of skills.

The types of costs that could be supported include:

- staff salaries
- rent
- utilities
- general office costs
- accountancy and audit costs
- fundraising
- governance and compliance
- costs supporting the core programmes of the organisation.

Preference is given to small to medium-sized charities (annual income of less than £200,000) where small grants can have more impact.

The funding is being made available through the Woodward Charitable Trust which will accept applications until 12pm on the 13th December 2024.

ONE STOP – Community Partnership Programme

Community groups and other not for profit organisations within a two-mile radius of a One Stop shop can apply for grants of up to £1,000 through the One Stop Community Partnership programme.

This programme supports projects and initiatives that are:

- Tackling food poverty
- Supporting the vulnerable
- Supporting the elderly
- Supporting low-income families

 Supporting a healthier lifestyle, such as Youth sports teams.

The programme provides partnership and financial assistance. Alongside a grant of up to £1,000, the One Stop Community Team and One Stop Store Team create a long-term tailored support programme for successful applicants. Grant recipients then partner with the One Stop Store Team at their local shop to deliver this programme.

Applications will be welcomed from various organisations including voluntary/community organisations, registered charities, schools, health bodies, Parish/Town councils, social enterprises, Community Interest Companies.

The next funding round will be open between the 2nd of December 2024 and the 24th January 2025

The Talented Athletes Fund

The council is keen to continue to support a wider range of local athletes by expanding on its previous Talented Athletes programme to:

- Support Nottinghamshire athletes aspiring to compete or already competing at the highest level in their sporting category.
