### How to instantly spot scam e-mails

Scams are attempts to trick you into giving your money or personal information to someone who has illegal intent.

The most common route for such illegal activity is via and email to your own email address that aims to trick you into believing it comes from some 'official' provider.

Typical examples have names such as your bank or other 'official' organisation or some other provider with whom you do financial or other personal things.

Such emails have titles that often try to sound 'urgent' such as 'deadline nearly here' or 'urgent attention!'.

Before replying to any such emails, there is one very easy 'click' that you can use to see if the email is genuine:

Just put your pointer over the name of the sender and right-click.

This action will show the email address of the sender. If this bears no relationship with the alleged sender, simply delete the email – don't open it since this could infect your computer with a virus or some other dangerous item.

An example of such a false email might look like this:

### Your accounts Please check your account now!

If you are banking with (say) HSBC you would expect the sender's email address to be something like customerrelations@hsbc.com but if the address revealed when right clicking over *Your accounts* looks nothing like this and has no hsbc.com in its address, then you have uncovered an attempted scam – delete the unopened email!

A further security point is that emails are the least important form of 'official' communication so even if you delete an email by mistake, the sender will either follow-up by telephoning you\* or, as a last option, writing a letter to you.

\*It is also important that telephone calls can also attempt to hide attempted scams. No bank, building society or other financial institution will contact you about your account details and ask you to confirm your account details. If you do receive such a call, treat it as another scam attempt.

This right-clic-over-the-sender's-name is a very useful tool for discovering who sent the email and can be used to uncover other interesting sources! We have come across these in such activities as making 'secret' arrangements for another's birthday!

Bassetlaw District Council is making improvements to Retford and Worksop's outdoor markets to help safeguard their future and make them more financially sustainable.

The plans, which were put together following consultation with traders, and interested parties on where future investment should be made, were approved by councillors at a Cabinet meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> March.

In Retford, the existing market stalls are getting a makeover by being shotblasted, repainted and extended to provide additional protection for traders and their goods, new white and green coverings are being introduced, while market stall boards will be upgraded.

At Worksop market, traders will also get new coverings for their stalls with clear back and side sheets, while work will continue to develop the indoor market project as an additional offering to the outdoor market.

Cllr Charles Adams, Cabinet Member for Business and Skills said: "We hope this investment in Retford and

Worksop outdoor Markets will help create a strong sense of identity as well as safeguard their future."

"We have worked with traders, and interested parties to gather feedback to make sure these improvements meet their needs and provide a better environment to do business."

Approval was also given to the Markets Management Team to engage with traders in both towns if any layout changes are needed in the future.

The work is estimated to cost £157k with funding coming from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund supported by other government monies.

### **Spring arrives at Muddy Fork**

It was a long, cold, damp, grey, miserable winter one way and another, and Muddy Fork, Retford's Gardening for Wellbeing charity, is glad to see the back of it. But it's now officially spring and things are on the move again. We've passed the equinox and everyone must be aware that the days really are getting longer now. The clocks changing will give us more light later in the day, it has been good to see some sunshine at last, and even the temperatures are finally showing signs of rising a little.

The Muddy Fork team has not been idle during the dormant period however. The winter maintenance programme seems to have been never-ending, and funnily enough the weeds still keep growing even when nothing

else does. But the end results are quite gratifying, with infra-structure improvements in evidence and the raised beds looking neat and tidy and ready for planting.

So now, with the marsh marigolds in the stream [right] and the daffodils on the bank brightening up the garden, it's time to get on with planting. An abundance of seed trays is jostling for



space in the polytunnels, the first of the potatoes are in, the strawberry runners [below] planted in the autumn are looking good, and plans for an asparagus bed are in

progress.



Muddy Fork has had an amazing couple of months since Christmas with multiple examples of community goodwill, and is still reeling at the generosity displayed by local individuals, including councillors. businesses and voluntary organisations.

Some incredible donations, in cash and in kind, have come in, with the most intriguing of these being the anonymous gifts, a wheelbarrow, and later two cold frames, which arrived unannounced and unexpectedly. Muddy Fork is so

grateful for the wonderful local support it receives, all of which helps sustain the charity both financially and moralewise.

# Nottinghamshire's recycling paper and cardboard briefing



Did you know that paper and cardboard make up over half of the material processed at the Materials Recovery Facility?

Follow our tips to help us recycle as much as possible:

- Please don't put any paper or card in a recycling bin if it has food on it, because papermills cannot recycle food contaminated material.
- Wet paper and cardboard is difficult for our sorting machinery to separate from other recyclables, so please keep it dry inside your recycling bin.
- Wallpaper cannot be recycled. It usually contains fungicides or ink types which are not suitable for recycling. Please put wallpaper in your general waste bin.
- ♦ Shredded paper also needs to go in your general waste bin. Like wet paper, it causes problems with our sorting machinery and because shredding cuts the fibres of the paper and cardboard into very short lengths, it is more difficult to turn this into good quality paper/card pulp for recycling into new items.
- Envelopes with windows are accepted for recycling and you do not need to remove the window. Padded envelopes are not suitable for recycling because they have a plastic liner, so please reuse these where possible or place in your general waste bin.
- Wrapping paper or cards that have any glitter or other embellishments attached to them such as ribbons or jewels cannot go in the recycling bin.

Remember to use our free Recycling Checker if you're not sure if an item can be recycled in Nottinghamshire.



### Spring on the farm

As the days grow longer the countryside of Clarborough and Welham begins to stir with life. The arrival of spring marks one of the busiest and most hopeful times of year on the farm.

Across the parish, farmers are nearing the end of the calving season. After weeks of close monitoring and long nights, the cows and their calves are doing well, and attention now turns to preparing for turnout. As soon as conditions allow, these pairs will be heading out to the fresh spring pasture a moment that always brings a sense of relief and reward. There's nothing quite like seeing young calves taking their first energetic leaps into open fields after a winter under cover. Also many local sheep farmers are turning out the spring lambs. However with this particular dry spell will there be enough grass for them to eat?

Spring also brings the need to make the most of the farm's natural resources. Farmyard manure is being carefully spread over the fields to return vital nutrients to the soil. A method that helps support the upcoming spring crops and improves soil structure and soil organic matter. It's a process rooted in tradition, but one that's as important as ever in modern farming.

This season has seen the sowing of spring linseed, aided by a well-timed drop of rain just before the dry spell set in. That bit of moisture helped give the crop a decent start, but now attention turns to the latest challenge: a lack of rainfall. Spring beans are being drilled into what can only be described as dust bowls dry clods of soil that are difficult to break down Locally known as bell metal. As these beans go in, I'm quite literally praying for rain. However as I write this, next week's forecast looks promising.

As the wheat and barley fields begin to stretch into growth this spring, careful nutrient management is key. Our approach to fertiliser application this season focuses not only on crop performance, but also on environmental responsibility and long-term sustainability. We're applying a balanced liquid fertiliser containing Nitrogen, Phosphate, Potassium, and Sulphur each essential for healthy plant growth and grain development. Nitrogen drives leafy green growth, Phosphate encourages strong rooting, Potassium supports overall plant health, and Sulphur helps the crop use nitrogen more efficiently while improving grain quality. The fertiliser is applied through a modern sprayer fitted with a dribble bar system, which gently places it at ground level. This helps minimise losses to the atmosphere and reduces the risk of scorching the crop, while placing nutrients where the plants need them most. What really helps us farm smarter and more sustainably is the integration of GPS and satellite-controlled technology. Using precision mapping, we can adjust the rate of fertiliser application across the field, ensuring that each area receives exactly what it needs - no more, no less. This avoids waste, prevents nutrient runoff, and protects surrounding habitats and watercourses. Liquid fertiliser also has the benefit of being fully water-soluble, so the nutrients are immediately available to the crop as soon as they hit the soil. This means we can feed the plant efficiently, without relying on weather conditions to break down granules. It's all part of our commitment to

sustainable farming: growing healthy crops while caring for the land, using modern tools to make thoughtful decisions that protect our environment.



As soon as one job's finished, another begins. The sprayer rarely stands still, attention has turned to the first major agrochemical application on cereal crops, known as the T0 timing. T0 marks a critical stage in the crop's development and lays the foundation for a healthy, high yielding harvest. At this point, we apply a carefully selected mix of trace elements, including zinc, copper, and manganese to name a few. While required in small amounts they are absolutely vital for plant health. These elements help support enzyme systems, root strength, and chlorophyll production, particularly during periods of rapid growth. Alongside the trace elements, fungicides are applied to protect the crop from early threats like septoria and rust, diseases that can quickly take hold in mild, damp spring conditions. Controlling disease early reduces the pressure later in the season, reducing the need for heavier chemical use. We also apply growth regulators at this stage. These don't just manage the crop's height they play an important role in strengthening the plant's stem and structure. This helps reduce the risk of lodging where tall, top-heavy crops fall over, especially when the ear (grain head) begins to form later in the season. Lodged crops are difficult to harvest, more prone to disease, and can suffer severe yield losses, so early prevention is key. As always, applications are made with precision in mind. Ensuring that every pass is accurate, applying exactly what's needed and where, reducing waste and protecting the environment. It's about combining agronomy, technology, and good timing. So while the countryside may appear calm on the surface, the reality is that spring is a sprint and the sprayer never stops.

Clarborough and Welham's countryside is always beautiful in spring the hedgerows starting to leaf up, birds nesting, and a general sense of renewal in the air. But behind that peaceful rural scene is a hive of activity, planning, and perseverance. Spring is a season of hard work and high hopes and like every year, myself and farmers across the UK are rising to the challenge. Let's see what summer has to offer for the countryside in Clarborough and Welham.

## Paws for Thought – then Lead by Example. Protecting Wildlife at Nature Reserves

Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust is once again supporting the national Paws for Thought campaign, urging dog owners to play their part in protecting nature by keeping their dogs on leads when visiting their nature reserves.

Locally, we're taking action by launching our new 'Lead by Example' volunteer team, a group of dedicated dog walkers who will set a positive example by keeping their dogs on leads and engaging with others in a friendly way.

Speaking on behalf of the Trust, Head of Communications Erin McDaid said: "I love visiting nature reserves with my dog, but with wildlife suffering severe declines across the UK I want to ensure that my dog isn't harming the wildlife I want to enjoy. Keeping dogs on leads when visiting nature reserves and other sensitive areas is a simple step all dog owners can all take to protect wildlife while still enjoying the great outdoors."

By keeping dogs on leads, on paths, and cleaning up after them, we can all help keep our precious local wildlife safe and the charity's new Lead by Example campaign – being piloted at its Attenborough and Skylarks Nature Reserves - aims to encourage a more wildlife-friendly way to visit nature reserves with your dog by reinforcing responsible dog ownership. As part of this pilot campaign, the Trust is recruiting a team of dog owners who are passionate about their pets and protecting wildlife – so that their dogs can act as 'Ambassadogs'. The charity hopes to roll out the campaign at other sites, including Idle Valley Nature Reserve near Retford,



in the coming months. Whilst the Trust asks people to keep their dogs on a lead whenever they visit our reserves, the charity has decided to launch the Lead by Example campaign now because dog disturbance can be particularly devastating to wildlife in the spring and summer when birds are nesting. Erin, whose dog Ginny [above] will be acting as an

Ambassadog, added: "Keeping your dog on a lead whilst on a nature reserve is always best for wildlife, but during the bird nesting season it can be the difference between success and failure for breeding birds – especially ground nesting species."

## New research reveals predicted long-term economic benefits of STEP for future generations

- More than 6,500 jobs a year could benefit Nottinghamshire residents at the peak of operations.
- Nottinghamshire's economy could be boosted by between £86 million and £210 million each year, for the next 40 years.

The full, predicted economic benefits of the UK's prototype fusion energy powerplant to be built at West Burton near Retford have been revealed for the first time.



The report – known as an economic impact assessment – gives a unique insight into the potential benefits of this world-class project. It covers a timeframe of more than 45 years, from when planning began in 2019, through to 2065, however the majority of these benefits are expected to be from 2030 onwards.

The ambitious project - Spherical Tokamak for Energy Production, known as STEP - is being led by UK Industrial Fusion Solutions Ltd (UKIFS) part of the UK Atomic Energy Authority group (UKAEA). Due to be built by 2040, it aims to revolutionise the way energy is generated thanks to cutting-edge fusion technology.

As well as the STEP fusion facility, a skills centre and a business park are planned.

The report identifies other key benefits for Nottinghamshire including a forecasted annual average of more than 1,000 new construction related jobs, which will boost the county's economy by £86m each year.

Meanwhile, the number of operational jobs due to be created is predicted to be around 2,760 each year which will bring an average annual economic boost worth £210m for Nottinghamshire.

For the East Midlands region as a whole, an average of 2,976 construction, planning and design-related jobs are due to be created each year, bringing an average £236m annual boost for the region's economy. An average of 6,440 new operational jobs are set to boost the East Midland's economy by around £489m each year.

Working closely with UKIFS Ltd, Nottinghamshire County Council commissioned the report on behalf of key partners, including Bassetlaw District Council, Lincolnshire County Council and West Lindsey District Council.

Cllr Charles Adams, Cabinet Member for Business and Skills at Bassetlaw District Council said:

"This report makes it clear how Bassetlaw and the wider area will feel the positive impacts of STEP and we very much welcome the investment and regeneration that will take place within our district over the coming years.

"In Bassetlaw we are working to become carbon neutral and have a vision to be the greenest, most sustainable district in which to live and work. STEP will make this possible, but it will also present a world of opportunities to the people who live here and the businesses that will be part of this journey."

Keith Girling, Nottinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Economic Development and Asset Management, said this is exciting news for future generations and the economy. He said:

"We already knew this once-in-a-lifetime project would create massive growth, investment and skills, but now we know the full extent of it. This is incredible news for our county and the region, particularly for our future generations who will really reap the benefits.

"This report now provides us with crucial insight and sets a benchmark to help partners plan for future investment as well as environmental and economic policies in that area."

Paul Methven, CEO of UKIFS, welcomed the publication of the report. He said:

UKAEA funded half of the report, with the other half made up of contributions from the Nottinghamshire County Council, Bassetlaw District Council, Lincolnshire County Council and West Lindsey District Council.

Economic and finance specialists Amion Consulting were commissioned by Nottinghamshire County Council to carry out the in-depth report. Analysts created an economic model to predict the key economic benefits that will be generated by STEP.

These benefits include the jobs linked directly to the project and the lucrative contracts for local and national supply chains. This research also takes into account the wider benefits to the local economy such as more disposable income for Nottinghamshire residents thanks to the creation of better-paid jobs.

While the benefits of STEP are expected beyond 2065, for the forecasted statistics to be as accurate as possible, this report covers the next 40 years.





# Windows 10 Countdown is nearly a knockout!

Alternatives to Microsoft (and Apple) products have taken a whole new importance with President Trumps worldwide tariff threats. Ubuntu Linux is a British product of Canonical Ltd. a privately held computer software company based in



London, founded and funded by South African entrepreneur Mark Shuttleworth in 2004.

Regular readers will have seen earlier articles that look for ways to upgrade Microsoft Windows 10 (and earlier) versions that don't cost a fortune. It is unfortunate that Microsoft seems to have designed Windows 11 to require hardware that has the very latest tweaks and so will only run on PCs and laptops that are less than about 3 years old. This means that many users feel thet have to purchase new systems if they want to move from Windows 10 to Windows 11.

Recent editions of Which? magazines have explored alternatives to this which have included 'best buy' Windows 11 devices but these have tended to cost upwards of £400 (at a minimum!)

Clarborough & Welham IT Group has been promoting a much more affordable – and powerful – alternative to Microsoft's Windows in the form of Ubuntu Linux which is starting to gain ground against the 'old firms' of Microsoft and Apple. Linux is a FREE open-source system which competes with Windows 11 head-on – and outright wins when looking at internet business. This competitiveness will be explored in greater depth by Which? ### RAF is part of NATO's answer to Vladimir Putin's Russia

National news platforms such as BBC, ITV and national newspapers hardly ever point out how much of our national military is trying to guess the sorts of things that Russia's leader, Vladimir Putin might be thinking.



RAF Typhoons [above right pair] and Swedish Air Force JAS-39 Gripens trained together in mid-April, 2025 for the first time since the start of their joint deployment to Malbork, Poland. The British Typhoons departed Malbork Air Base first to simulate an adversary formation, with the Swedish Gripens being scrambled to intercept the Typhoons, supported by a German Air Force A400M air-toair refuelling aircraft [opposite]

This was a first for the detachment, however it is not the first time the RAF Typhoon and Swedish Air Force Gripen aircraft have trained together. Previously, in October 2022 they paired as part of the Joint Expeditionary Force (JEF) at Ravlunda Range in southern Sweden.

The recent training sortie allowed pilots from No. II (Army Cooperation) Squadron and Swedish Air Force 211 and 212 Fighter Squadrons, to gain first-hand experience of working together. This will lead to a better understanding of capabilities and increased interoperability both in the air and amongst the ground crews.

Operation Chessman is the UK contingent delivering the NATO enhanced Air Policing mission. RAF personnel currently deployed at Malbork Airbase, are under the command of 140 Expeditionary Air Wing. Personnel from across the RAF are currently deployed to Malbork alongside NATO's newest member, Sweden, until July 2025.





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# Why is Volunteering good for volunteers as well as their recipients?

We come across appeals for volunteers on a very regular basis, but do volunteers themselves benefit from offering their 'services' free-of-charge?

The short answer, based on feedback to the vast body of volunteering agencies is 'Yes' but the nature of these benefits vary widely. In this short article we will explore, very briefly, the major benefits that volunteering can give to individuals.

Firstly, lets explore a few advantages that can come to either young people or those who are in employment – or need to get into employment or are seeking either promotion in their current workplace or a change of career.

For such individuals the major benefits are:

- Increase in self-confidence.
- Inter-personal skills.
- Developing new skills
- Improving mental and physical health
- Expanding one's C.V.

The list goes on, but these are often the skills that recent volunteers highlight.

For young people it is generally the case that a minimum age of 18 years is required, often for legal reasons. It is also worth noting that time-commitment can vary widely

from a matter of minutes or irregular activities through to an almost 'full-time' involvement – volunteer's choice!

For individuals of more mature ages, right through to those who are retired from regular employment, the same benefits as those listed above can apply but particular reasons that come from these age groups also include;

- Sense of connection to others in your community

- Enhancing inter-personal skills
- Giving something back to your community
- Stay physically and emotionally healthy

For younger people, the expansion of CV evidence can open up new opportunities or prepare the ground for those seeking greater employment options.

For retired people, their work-related skills can help the organisation they join in all sorts of 'professional' ways that expand the organisation's skills set.

### Local Government Reorganisation Update

At the March meeting of Bassetlaw District Council, Councillor Fraser McFarland voted in favor of the cross-party recommendation for local government reorganisation. This proposal seeks to create two new authorities in Nottinghamshire: North Notts Council, which will encompass Ashfield, Bassetlaw,



Gedling, Mansfield, Newark, and Sherwood councils, and South Notts Council, covering Broxtowe, Rushcliffe, and Nottingham City.

Cllr McFarland believes this new structure is the best option available, as it will ensure that decisions impacting local communities are made within the region, addressing the unique needs and priorities of residents. "By establishing a dedicated North Notts Council, we can enhance local accountability and ensure our voices are heard on matters that directly affect our lives," he stated during the meeting.

The proposed reorganisation aims to streamline governance and improve service delivery, making it easier for local councils to collaborate and respond effectively to community needs. Cllr McFarland emphasized the importance of having leaders who understand the local context and can advocate for their communities. However, he also expressed the need for a referendum, advocating that residents should have the final say on these significant changes. "It's crucial that we engage the community in this decision-making process. Their voices matter in shaping our future," he added.

Cllr McFarland encourages everyone to participate in this important conversation about local governance and to share their thoughts on the proposed changes. Together, they can work towards a future that truly reflects the aspirations of Bassetlaw residents.
